## **Principal's Report**

#### **College Captains**

Our College captains in 2021 are, Emily Ben, Tia Garlick, Elijah Jones and Zak Lumley. I look forward to working with our captains and the broader student leadership team in 2021. Congratulations to these students on being appointed to these important roles.

#### 2020 results

While 2020 provided numerous challenges for our students I am very pleased to report on some positive results for our graduates. Over 90% of our students that were seeking a university or TAFE pathway were successful in their first round applications. Successful senior certificate attainment at VCE was 99% and VCAL was 94%. Our VCE mean study score was 28.

#### **School Gymnasium and Performing Arts upgrades**

The final approvals are being completed for this exciting project at the College with construction set to begin later in Term 1 of 2021. The project includes a new double court facility as well as upgrades to the Community Theatre changerooms. Both the new gym and Theatre upgrade will provide excellent resources for our students and the community. The College website and College Facebook page will be used to share updates throughout the construction phase. The project is set to be completed approximately 12 months from the construction start date.

#### **School Review**

As communicated in 2020, the College will be undertaking our Department of Education review. All government schools are required to complete this process every 4 years. The College was initially set to complete this in 2020, however, this was shifted to 2021 due to the impact of the global pandemic. Students, staff and parents are provided opportunities to be involved in this process. I am seeking interest from parents to participate in parent forums during the first two weeks of March. Arrangements will then be made directly with parents and carers after receiving an expression of interest.

#### **School buses**

It has come to my attention that the buses leaving from Brunt Street (near the College Theatre) are not widely used by students. These buses are in place specifically for school students. I am working through some of the reasons for this and will be seeking to implement solutions to address this issue. I will keep the College community informed of any developments of this work through Term 1. 



## A word from our Assistant Principals

Welcome to the 2021 school year. I especially welcome those families who are new to our school community. I hope 2021 will be a most rewarding year filled with many wonderful opportunities for learning and growth.



Above - Our learning Architecture is used by all teachers to inform our teaching practice.

At Cranbourne Secondary College our Teaching and Learning Model is the Learning Architecture. This is an evidence based model and I would like to acknowledge Esther Weichert, our learning partner for her coaching in supporting us with this work.

To ensure the growth of all students at our College, teachers implement the following phases from the Learning Architecture:

#### **PHASE 1: Know Our Students**


- Teachers collect and analyse evidence and data to ascertain student readiness for learning, preparing accurate preassessments to determine each child's point of entry
- Teachers have an ongoing focus on formative assessment to make sure they address the point of entry of their students to bridge any gaps successfully

#### PHASE 2: Plan for Teaching and Learning

- Teachers unpack the Victorian Curriculum and extract key skills to ensure a guaranteed and viable curriculum.
- Teachers determine what learning is essential, relevant, empowering, and enduring for their students
- Teachers plan activities that address at least four levels of complexity and work towards bridging learning gaps through differentiation and personalisation

#### **PHASE 3: Teach Our Students**

- Teachers deliver engaging lessons that support students to develop knowledge, understanding, skills and capabilities across the curriculum
- Teachers use The Gradual Release of Responsibility Instructional Model, as illustrated in the diagram below.



#### **PHASE 4: Assess Our Students**

- Teachers have a strong emphasis on formative assessment to consistently track student learning
- · Teachers create summative assessments based on different levels of complexity
- Teachers provide timely and specific feedback
- · Teachers provide multiple opportunities for students to learn the skill
- Teachers use evidence and data to inform future learning

#### **TUTOR LEARNING INITIATIVE**

The Tutor Learning Initiative is a Victorian Government Policy designed to support students whose learning has been disrupted due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Each school's funding allocation is based on a model of no more than five students for 26 weeks. Even with the very best of teachers' efforts in 2020, there are some students who have not been able to engage as entirely in the remote learning program as they would have been able to in the usual classroom environment. This is likely to include students at all ability and achievement levels.

Students who may require additional support include those:

- · with low levels of English
- · with home environments not conducive to remote and flexible learning
- · already at risk of disengaging from school
- enrolled in applied programs, and
- · who need educational and health and wellbeing supports at school but were unable to access them at home

At Cranbourne Secondary College, any student outside of the Literacy and Numeracy Support Programs who experienced significant disruption to their learning in 2020 will receive additional educational support from a tutor in their English, Maths and Life Skills classes. Student data and evidence will inform the selection of students across Years 7-12.

By engaging tutors to support students with intensive learning, classroom teachers will have a greater capacity to ensure all students' learning needs are met. Additional options for before or after school support will also be made available.

## PROGRESSIVE ACHIEVEMENT TESTING ON DEMAND TESTING

Progressive Achievement Testing (PAT) and On-Demand Testing (ODT) took place towards the end of Term 4, 2020 and our Year 7 students are currently undertaking this testing. Students that were absent during this time will undergo the testing during our catch up sessions scheduled to take place over the coming weeks.

These tests focus on monitoring student growth over time and allow our staff to tailor their teaching to individual learners' needs in our classrooms.

At Cranbourne Secondary College, we pride ourselves on knowing our learners and their readiness to learn, and these assessments reflect our commitment to deliver the best program to each student.

#### You can encourage your son or daughter to:


- be organised

#### Pastoral Care Years 7 to 10

Pastoral Care is the ongoing support, guidance and management provided by the student's significant teacher. Utilizing Life Skills lessons the Pastoral Care program provides every student with the opportunity to develop their social, emotional and academic skills.

To enable success an effective partnership between the school and home must exist and Pastoral Care Teachers are key to the development of these positive relationships with parents/guardians. Teachers taking on a role in Pastoral Care have an extensive knowledge of processes and procedures for the year level that they are working in and are able to clearly articulate these to students, staff and parent/guardians. You can contact your child's Pastoral Care teacher via the Compass Portal or by calling the College.

#### School-Wide Positive Behaviour Support (PBS)

As students settle into the new school year, utilising the PBS framework, staff have been focusing on explicitly teaching students two behaviors that will support their learning:

Responsible: We arrive on time Responsible: We bring the required equipment

#### Responsible: We arrive on time

Students are expected to go to their lockers and gather their equipment for the next period(s) when the warning bell rings. Music plays during this time to signal that students should quickly collect their required equipment and make their way to class.

#### Responsible: We bring the required equipment

Students are expected to bring their required equipment to every lesson. This assists students to be able to participate in their learning and supports students to develop their organisational skills.

The required equipment for every lesson is:

- 1. Netbook (7-9)/ Bring your own device (BYOD) (10-12)
- 2. Student Diary
- 3. Pencil case with stationery inside
- 4. Workbook/Exercise book
- 5. Mask (to be worn inside at all times)

Some subjects have specialist equipment such as a textbook, calculator, container or PE uniform. Teachers of these subjects have explained what the required specialist equipment is and will expect students to bring this to their class. If you require assistance with purchasing required equipment (including netbooks, textbooks, CAS Calculators and school uniform) please speak with a Year Level Engagement Coordinator from your child's Sub School.

#### **Student Diaries**

All students should have received a student diary from their Pastoral Care or Form Assembly Teacher. If your child hasn't received a diary they should speak with their Pastoral Care or Form Assembly teacher. Student diaries are part of the required equipment for each lesson and students should carry them with a note from their classroom teacher any time that they have been given permission to leave class.

#### CHILD SAFE STANDARDS

From August 2016 Ministerial Order No. 870 came into force. All schools are included in this order which establishes zero tolerance to child abuse.

We seek to ensure that all students reach their academic, social and emotional potential, within the School-Wide Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) framework. 

## SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS - INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

## WHAT IS A SCHOOL COUNCIL AND WHAT DOES IT DO?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within statewide guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

#### WHO IS ON THE SCHOOL COUNCIL?

For most primary school councils, there are three possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent category more than onethird of the total members must be from this category.
   Department employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected school employee category members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional community member category members are coopted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.

A small number of school councils have Nominee members.

For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership:

A mandated elected student member category, with two positions.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### WHY IS PARENT MEMBERSHIP SO IMPORTANT?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

## DO I NEED SPECIAL EXPERIENCE TO BE ON SCHOOL COUNCIL?

Each member brings their own valuable life skills and knowledge to the role. Councilors may need to develop skills and acquire knowledge in areas that are unfamiliar to them. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

#### **HOW CAN YOU BECOME INVOLVED?**

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term one each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant

In view of this, you might consider

- · standing for election as a member of the school council
- · encouraging another person to stand for election.

## WHAT DO YOU NEED TO DO TO STAND FOR ELECTION?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations following the commencement of Term one each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March unless the usual time line has been varied by the Minister.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent category.

Department employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not engaged in work are eligible to nominate for parent membership of the school council at that school.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election.

You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt in the mail following the receipt of your completed nomination.

Generally, if there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.


#### REMEMBER





Currently school staff are focusing on supporting students to be responsible and bring their required equipment to class.

Students are expected to bring their required equipment to every lesson. This assists students to be able to participate in their learning and supports students to develop their organisational skills.

The required equipment for every lesson is:

- 1. Mask (currently mandatory indoors)
- 2. Netbook (7-9)/ Bring your own device (BYOD) (10-12)
- 3. Student Diary
- 4. Pencil case with stationery inside
- 5. Workbook/Exercise book

Some subjects have specialist equipment such as a textbook, calculator, container and PE uniform. Teachers of these subjects will explain what the specialist equipment is and will expect students to bring this to their class.

Staff will be verbally reinforcing students and issuing credits to students who are responsible and bring their required equipment to class. Staff will also be reteaching the behaviour of bringing the required equipment and recording a Minor behaviour on Compass when students do not bring their required equipment to class.
