Principal's Report

Dear Parents, Carers, Families and Students,

Thank-you for your ongoing support of our work together. The latter part of Term 1 and the beginning of Term 2 has again been a busy time at the College for students and staff. Please see below some key messages from me regarding both recent and upcoming areas of focus for our school.

National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

Our students are reaching the end of the NAPLAN period and I am pleased to report that despite the ongoing challenges that COVID presents, our participation rates are over 90%. The results from NAPLAN will be available later in the year and provide one of many units of measurements of school performance. Our aim is to continue to build on the growth measures in NAPLAN that show student progression between Years 7 and 9.

Attitudes to School Survey

The Department of Education and Training (DET) Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS) is now underway and it has been a pleasure to be delivering this in classes. The survey is an opportunity for students to share views on their experiences at school. The DET survey is administered to all schools and similar to NAPLAN provides various units of measurement on school performance. The survey is anonymous, and the data collected is used to inform the College of areas of success as well as improvement.

The survey also includes some questions of a sensitive nature relating to mental health and overall student wellbeing. It has been reiterated to students that as the survey is anonymous it is not possible for the College to follow up with students who have indicated that they may need support. While administering the survey College leadership have reiterated the processes at school for students who have mental health and wellbeing concerns. These include the ability for students to self-refer to the Student Wellbeing Team. I would encourage parents to engage in these conversations at home also and to contact the College should they need further information.

Uniform and arriving on time

Thank you to parents for your ongoing support in ensuring students arrive in full school uniform and on time for classes. I would again like to remind parents that supports are available if you are unable to source the required uniform and equipment for learning. There has been a noticeable shift in the standard of our students meeting our dress code requirements and punctuality in the morning. Maintaining and continuing to improve this is something that will be supported by myself and College staff into the future.

Senior Certificate changes

As parents may have seen in the media there are some significant changes occurring to senior certificates for 2023. The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) will no longer be available. The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) will now include 2 options for students. The current VCE remains unchanged and the VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) will be available for students as of 2023. The VCE VM will mirror the credit arrangements of the VCE and is a two-year program. We will be working with our Year 10 students to understand these changes as they begin to consider subject selection for next year.

On a final note it has been wonderful to host some recent events at the College and re-open our doors to the community. In early April the student 'Show-up' performance evening was an excellent way to finish Term 1. More recently the Eid festival was a beautiful celebration for our school community featuring dance, music, singing a poetry. Hosting our parents and students in the community theatre is a reminder of how special it is for us to be able to come together in person.



School for Student Leadership



After the tumultuous 2 years we have had in the Performing Arts department we are ready to kick start our new College Production for 2022!


This year we are not doing a musical – but rather a comedy play called 'Grate Expectations'.

IDAHOBIT

International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, Interphobia & Transphobia (IDAHOBIT) celebrates LGBTQIA+ people globally, and raises awareness for the work still needed to combat discrimination.

HISTORY TIME: On May 17, 1990, the World Health Assembly of the World Health Organization approved the International Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems (ICD 10), which no longer listed homosexuality as a diagnosis!

As such, May 17th was chosen in 2004 as the date for IDAHOBIT.

Some less fun facts are that 75% of queer youth experience some form of discrimination, while 61% experience verbal abuse and 19% experience physical abuse. This discrimination has a severe impact on the wellbeing of rainbow people, with 24.4% of lesbian, gay and bisexual people and 36.2% of trans people experiencing depression. This is compared to the rates in the general population at approximately 6.8%.

IDAHOBIT aims to help reduce these statistics by making the lives of queer people safer and happier.




Will Kostakis Author Visit

Refugee Education Support Program (RESP)

We are very excited to announce that our application to partner with the Refugee Education Support Program (RESP) for 2022/2023 was successful. The College RESP team will participate in professional development and coordinate the implementation of processes to enable us to better support young people of refugee backgrounds at Cranbourne Secondary College. As part of our RESP journey we look forward to working closely with the Centre for Multicultural Youth and Foundation House.

What is RESP

The Refugee Education Support Program (RESP) is a two-year program aimed at assisting schools to identify and implement strategies which have a positive impact on the achievement, engagement and wellbeing outcomes of students from refugee backgrounds and their families.

RESP uses a Whole School Approach to explore five areas of action: teaching and learning, families, partnerships with community agencies, school climate and transitions.

Children and young people from refugee backgrounds are often highly motivated, bringing with them a range of skills and strengths to succeed in their education, but can often face significant challenges in accessing the support they need to remain engaged in and successfully navigate school.

These educational challenges are often compounded due to learning a new language, navigating a new culture and social system, building peer relationships, negotiating grief and loss associated with separation from significant others and an unfamiliar and different education environment.

In response, RESP provides schools with coordinated support to have a positive impact on the academic and wellbeing outcomes of children and young people of refugee backgrounds.

How has RESP helped other schools?

The Refugee Education Support Program has contributed to the following outcomes for past schools:

- Schools have improved their capacity to plan for and meet the needs of refugee children and families in relation to teaching and learning practices, school policies and processes.
- **Teachers and school staff** have increased capacity to engage and support children and families.
- **Families** of students from refugee backgrounds are more engaged with their school, their child's learning, and community.
- Longer term improved school engagement, achievement and well-being outcomes for children and young people of refugee backgrounds.

Following Road Signs Around Schools

As we move through the weeks of Term 2, it is important that we continue to drive safely around schools and ensure we are following the road signs. Schools are busy places, and the signs can sometimes seem confusing. Here are some of the road signs you may see around schools:



This is a **No Parking** sign. This sign is seen in areas that are used as a **Drop off Pick up Zone**. You cannot leave your vehicle unattended and you cannot stop for more than **two minutes**. The times may be a little different at each school, but the rules are the same. Fines can apply if the signs are not followed.

This sign tells us that we are driving in a **School Zone**. The speed limit around schools is **40km** on school days between 8.00am and 9.30am and 2.30pm and 4.00pm. Slow down and keep children safe.





This is a **No Stopping** sign. This sign means you **cannot stop** your car for any reason, at any time. No Stopping zones are there because it is **dangerous** for a car to stop there for any amount of time. Dropping off a child in a No Stopping zone is **illegal** and dangerous.
