2023 NAPLAN preparation and 2022 NAPLAN results

NAPLAN in 2023 is occurring earlier than previous years. In 2023 it is scheduled for mid-March. Students are in the process of receiving supports in class regarding the completion of the tests. I would like to wish them every success in completing these assessments.

While on the topic of NAPLAN it was very pleasing to see the College results on the myschool website. The website shows that across all categories (aside from Grammar) the students have recorded 'above' average results when compared with schools with similar data. This is a fantastic result – well done to students and staff. It was also great to see completion rates of 96%, this is above the national average.

High Expectations matched with High Support

The above phrase is one that we have been working with over the last 12-14 months. It is a statement that guides our thinking and actions at the College regarding student learning and social behaviour. Cassandra Fernando visit

Cassandra Fernando opened the MultiPride Harmony Wall for the college. The Student Representative Council invited her back to open the wall after her first visit to the school in 2022. Plans had been underway for three years to create the art work but a pandemic got in the way.

MultiPride leader Asma Saquib talked to Cassandra and the leadership team about the project and what it represents to the students in the college. Cassandra is a proud migrant, a pastry chef, an advocate for essential workers and the Federal Labor Member for Holt. She came to Australia with her family when she was 11, and she has called Melbourne's South-East home ever since. For Cassandra, opening such a project fits perfectly with her own story as well as the story of many of our families in our college community.

Ms Fernando addressed the whole school in our first assembly for the year and touched upon her journey, as well as the three values that she upholds to this day: hard work, commitment and gratitude.

MultiPride has operated in the college since 2010. Many of our students have found this leadership group a rewarding and life changing part of their school life. They organise cultural awareness days and festivals and develop policy and programs to support the schools inclusion and diversity goals.

Excursions

Year 12 Biology Excursion

Students attended Casey Tech School and were provided the opportunity to transform bacteria. Green fluorescent protein (GFP) from bioluminescent jellyfish had been supplied to us by their industry partner, Southern Biological. Students worked in teams to transform E. coli bacteria under different conditions, creating their very own transgenic bacteria that fluoresce under UV light.





Humanities

Year 9 Australian History students went on a guided tour of Melbourne by the education team at the Koorie Heritage Trust. Students learnt about how Naarm (Melbourne) has changed over time and about the significance of the Birrarung Wilam to the local Kulin peoples. Students also visited the Old Treasury Building where they connected the story of early Melbourne, the growth of democracy, and life in the city to their current studies.

September 2022

Morrisby Profiling Assessment

This week Year 9 students participated in the Morrisby Profiling Assessment. Morrisby Careers provides the Year 9 students tools needed to help them discover the world of work and pathways forward, including subjects of further study, detailed career information and a comprehensive directory of higher courses, institutions and apprenticeships. Students completed quizzes and questions which resulted in a suggested list of potential careers for them based on their answers. The potential careers matched abilities, interests and personality. The report assists students with subject selections from year 10 to 12, so it is recommended that they retain this report until the completion of year 12.

One of our students commented, "It not only helped me understand myself and my learning goals, but it also opened up so many resources and opportunities that I didn't even know existed."

Cranbourne Secondary College employs the Careers Curriculum Framework (CCF) to help develop a local, custom and high-quality career development program for students in Year 7-12. At Cranbourne Secondary College wedeliver quality Career Education to ensure all of our students have access to high-quality career education and are prepared for life beyond school through more informed career and pathway decisions.

STOPIT service

STOPIT is a new Victoria Police text notification service enabling commuters, including school students, to report any form of inappropriate behaviour that makes them feel uncomfortable, frightened or threatened on the public transport network.

How STOPIT works

The STOPIT service enables commuters to use their mobile phone to promptly, easily and discreetly report inappropriate behaviours.

To use the service, commuters simply text 'STOPIT' to 0499 455 455. This triggers an automated response that includes a link to where the commuter can provide more details about what's just happened. When people report these types of inappropriate behaviours, police can investigate and identify offenders to improve safety on public transport for everyone.

Parents and carers are encouraged to consider discussing the new service with students who travel on public transport. Students who use mobile phones outside of school hours are encouraged to save the STOPIT number in their mobile phone.

Please note, STOPIT is for reporting non-urgent incidents on public transport. Always phone 000 in an emergency.

Head Start

Head Start is a school-based apprenticeship and traineeship (SBAT) program that helps students in years 10-12 develop skills, capabilities and confidence that employers in growth industries need. Head Start students receive paid on-the-job training that contributes to their VCE or VCE Vocational Major and leads to a qualification.

More than 2200 students have participated in Head Start. As a host school of the Head Start program, it is greatly appreciated when we are able to share some of the positive outcomes that have impacted our students.

At the recent Industry Excellence Awards, Joachim was awarded Automotive Apprentice of the Year: School Based. Joachim is a current Year 12 VCE student. He attends school Monday, Tuesday and Friday and his subjects are English, Math Methods, Physics, French and Certificate III Marine Technology. He attends his workplace Mercury Marine 2 days per week and attends the Victorian School of Languages on Saturdays to undertake his French Studies. His dedication to what he is doing, and his ability to focus and learn, were recognised by this award from Kangan Institute.

Teaching & Learning

Sparx Maths

SPARX Maths is an online weekly homework tool that will provide students with questions relevant to our current Maths topics at a level appropriate to them. This is designed to reinforce what we are teaching in the classroom, but also to establish positive homework routines in our junior school in preparation for senior



school. This program will begin this week for our Year 7 and Year 8 cohorts and will continue weekly for the remainder of the year, with an exception of during CAT weeks and during NAPLAN period for the Year 7's.

Literatu

Literatu is an online program that builds a unified whole-ofstudent view across all available data. In Term 4 last year and during Empowering Learners this year, all students were taught how to access and analyse their data on Literatu.

At a glance, students can see their CAT, PAT, and NAPLAN results. They can delve deeper into their data and identify specific skills that they have demonstrated and those that they are yet to master. Students can compare previous testing results to identify if they are progressing as expected, if their performance is stalling, or if they are exceeding expectations. As <u>Literatu is a website</u>, it can be accessed from any device. You can ask your child to show you their data any time.

Alumni Program

The Cranbourne Secondary College alumni program is now in its second year, and it's proven to be a wonderful way to support students, complement the curriculum and provide real-life examples of different careers.

The alumni program aims to educate, motivate and inspire students to aim high in their current studies and to reach for a rewarding career in their future. It's also a vehicle for past students to stay connected, be part of the school community and to 'go back and give back' to students.

In 2022, we had 12 alum (past students) return to Cranbourne Secondary College to speak to students about their pathway after school, further studies and about the job they do. This included a lawyer, a paramedic, a psychologist, an engineer and a filmmaker, just to name a few. Alumni sessions give students an insight into what a job/career is really like, the skills required, studies undertaken and the rewards and challenges of the job.

In 2023, we plan to grow the alumni community and its involvement with the College. There are plans to run an interactive careers event for Year 10's as they start to select subjects for years 11 & 12 and think about life after school. Alumni can also offer students work experience placement and career/course guidance. Subject-specific sessions will continue throughout the year, where we match an alum to speak to a specific subject, to support learning and provide information about their job and working in that industry.

PBS X-Change

This week the PBS X-Change will be opening. The X-Change is a room where students can exchange the credits they have earnt for reinforcing items. Below you can read about what a credit is and how the X-Change appears on Compass. Encourage your child/children to attend the X-Change and exchange their credits when they have earnt enough. If they would like to suggest new X-Change items they can speak to an SRC leader about this.

What is a Positive Behaviour Credit?

When a staff member observes your child behave in a positive way they may issue a Positive Behaviour Credit to your child on Compass. Students "earn" positive behaviour credits for independently displaying positive behaviours. Staff will not "give out" credits when students ask for them. You will see the positive behaviour credits appear in your child's student chronicle feed. It will look similar to the example below. The compass chronicle log will tell you when, where and how your child was respectful, responsible, a learner or a community member. This will allow you to also discuss the positive behaviour at home with your child.
