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From The Principal

Dear students, parents and families,

Thank you for your support in the smooth start to Term 2. It was great to share student learning progress with you at our recent parent teacher and student conferences and I look forward to seeing future learning and personal growth in our students over this Term. Our progress reporting cycle will enable students, parents and teachers to monitor 2023 progress and growth via the GPA system. Year levels will also be celebrating student growth as part of student assemblies later this term along with attendance, achievement and behaviour.

In this newsletter, there is some important information regarding our School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) matrix. The matrix has been very successful since its initial design a few years ago and due to some changes to our school values the matrix has now been updated and is shared with you for feedback. Our school values of Learning, Care, Community and Contribution have influenced the changes to the matrix as well as our purpose statement. Our purpose statement is now 'At Cranbourne Secondary College we are a respectful, responsible learning community'. I look forward to receiving your feedback and the impact this will have on our behaviour matrix.

On the topic of feedback, there are two important pieces of information for our school community to consider. The first is the annual Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS). The survey will be completed by students at school over the next few weeks. It provides an excellent opportunity for students to share their views on our school and their experiences both in and outside the classroom. It also provides an opportunity for students to reflect on how the information gained from this survey will be used to inform decision making and school improvements for our students. The second opportunity relates to an announcement made by the City of Casey. The council has put forward an initial proposal to explore the building of an integrated service centre including Youth Services, Library and customer service centre, on Lyall Street. The building would be located very near to the College. I am drawing your attention to this as members of our College community and therefore important stakeholders in the consultation process. Student Voice and Agency in Action

Every term, our teachers meet to evaluate the impact of their teaching programs, this is called moderation. Staff look at assessment data and student feedback to guide their work. This term, our year 7 and 8 Class Captains joined our staff to share their thoughts. By inviting students to moderation, we allow them to see how we use the initial feedback they provide us and the analysis of their growth data by staff. They see that based on their assessments; staff determine what we will do in the future.

Their participation allowed teachers to ask additional questions in relation to initial feedback. It provided further insight. This also allowed us to build on the connections staff have with students. Thank you to our Year 7 and 8 Class Captains for trialling this process.



The Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge is now open and Cranbourne Secondary College is excited to be participating. The PRC application offers a range of exciting features including:

- access to a library catalogue (including book images and blurbs)
- a modern user-friendly interface
- rewarding students with badges as challenge milestones are achieved
- the option for students to mark books as a favourite, give them a star rating or complete a book review

The Challenge is open to all Victorian children from birth to Year 10 in recognition of the importance of reading for literacy development. It is not a competition; but a personal challenge for children to read a set number of books by 8 September 2023.

Children from Prep to Year 2 are encouraged to read or 'experience' 30 books with their parents and teachers. Children from Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 15 books.

All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian Premier and former Premiers.

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Solutions to chess puzzles Diagram 1

CRANBOURNE SECONDARY COLLEGE

1. Bc2 Nxf4 2. Qd8+ Bf8 3.Qxf6 and White wins since the black knight on f4 is threatened and White also threatens to take on f7 and h7 for checkmate.

Diagram 2

Black's back rank (the 8th row) is weak. If White can place a rook there, then Black's king has no escape squares. White wins after 1. Ra1 Nc5 2. Nxe7+ Rxe7 3. Ra8+ Re8 4. Rxe8# checkmate.



Is your teenager struggling to attend school due to anxiety, depression or emotional distress?

Be among the first to trial a new online parenting program designed to support parents of teens struggling with school attendance.

Researchers from Monash University and Deakin University are offering parents a **FREE online parenting program** designed to support parents of teenagers who have **difficulty attending school due to anxiety, depression, or emotional distress** (sometimes called 'school refusal', 'school can't', or 'school phobia'). The program is being offered as part of a research trial.

What's included in the program?

- A parenting self-assessment tool with personalised feedback
- Up to 13 online modules with practical strategies to support your teen's mental health and school attendance
- Complete weekly modules and work towards goals

Who can take part?

You may be eligible to participate if:

- you are the parent or guardian of a teenager aged 12-18
- live in Australia
- can read, write, and speak in English,
- have regular access to the Internet.

The program is not recommended as a sole source of support for young people experiencing school refusal. We recommend seeking professional support from a mental health or education professional alongside completing this program. Although all parents are able to take part, please also note that the program content is not tailored for parents of teenagers with Autism Spectrum Disorder or intellectual disability.

What else is involved?

To help us evaluate the program, we'll ask you to complete two online surveys about your parenting and your teen's mental health. We may also invite you to complete an interview about your experience with the program. You'll receive a \$20 gift voucher after completing the second survey, and an additional \$20 gift voucher if you complete an interview.
