The Victorian State School's Spectacular will be televised later in the year.



Class of 2023 Alumni address

Elijah spoke about how he is working as a tutor at the college while studying a Bachelor of Commerce and a Bachelor of Arts, alongside a Bachelor of Education, at Monash University. 


