# **From the Principal**

Dear students, parents, carers and families,

I hope you are well and have had a positive start to Term 2.

It has been wonderful to return to the College after the last three terms working in a different role.

My time spent as an acting Senior Improvement Education Leader (SEIL) has provided me with an expanded view and deeper understanding of both the government education system and educational leadership. In the SEIL role, I was able to learn with and from an array of experts while undertaking school reviews as well as supporting the strategic direction of leadership teams and schools.

I am looking forward to applying new learning and fresh perspectives to our wonderful school and continuing to lead the fantastic staff in our collective work in improving student outcomes.

### School Review, New Strategic Plan and our 2024 Annual Report.

Our 4 yearly review was completed in Term 1, resulting in a new strategic plan for the school. The plan for our school includes both an endorsement of our work over the previous 4 years, while also combining current, and anticipated Department of Education (DE) priorities.

The most significant DE priorities is the implementation of the new Victorian Teaching and Learning Model (VTLM 2.0). Further information on this can be found on the DE website – <u>Information for Parents and Carers</u>. The VTLM 2.0 is informed by the Science of Learning and associated evidence based teaching practices. The model was developed in collaboration with the <u>Australian Education Research Organisation (AERO)</u>.

While many of the teaching approaches included in the VTLM 2.0 occur in schools regularly, the model provides

an opportunity for the refinement of these practices with closer appreciation and linkage to the ways in which students learn best according to cognitive science and brain development. This is exciting to be leading at the school and I look forward to sharing further information regarding our work in future newsletters and other communications. ### Term 3 – Pathways and course selection

During Term 3, students from years 8 to 11 will undertake subject selection for 2026.

Further information regarding the various processes, activities and events tailored to each year level will be shared via Compass – please be on the lookout for this information. For our current Year 9 and Year 10 students, the focus on pathways and subject selection is particularly important.

### Year 9 into 10

For our Year 9 students, considering Year 10 options is significant. It is their first year in the senior part of the school and they will be able to apply to commence either a,

- Unit 1/2 subject Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) subject, or,
- a first year Vocational Education and Training (VET) certificate.

Students will be required to undertake an application process where an assessment of their readiness will be completed.

During Year 10, they will also have the opportunity to undertake work experience – this is a golden opportunity to help students better understand the world of work and to explore potential areas of career interest.

### Year 10 into 11

The selection of subjects for our Year 10 students commencing Year 11 is very significant as they will be asked to deeply consider areas of interest while also assessing their readiness for their final years of schooling. Our students in year 10 are provided many opportunities to engage in this thinking and planning with staff, past students (Alumni), and some of our current students. The work experience program in Year 10 is also an excellent opportunity for students to explore workplaces, industries, and skills that can inform subject and certificate selection in their senior years.

In terms of students 'assessing their readiness' for their final years of schooling, the College uses a variety of data sources including progress reports, attendance, Literacy and Numeracy levels, School Wide Positive Behaviour Support data to help students understand the most suitable subjects for their pathway to senior school completion.

I look forward to working with students, families and staff through this work.





In Term Two, several of our students from all different year levels participate in the Le Mana Empower Pasifika Program, an inspiring initiative that celebrates and promotes Pasifika cultures within the Australian education system. The program aims to empower young Pasifika youth by developing their leadership skills and supporting their engagement in education. to celebrate their culture and meaningfully Fostering connections and helping our students celebrate their cultural backgrounds enhances students' cultural pride and promotes inclusivity and diversity within our college community. During their most recent session, the group began with a formal introduction song - Pepeha by New Zealand band Six60.



In small groups, students each learned a segment of the music and then combined the segments to sing the whole song. Students learned the meanings of key words from the song, like mana (spirit), aroha (love), and moana (sea). The group explored Pasifika cooking practices and customs, such as the umu or hangi, and

the different gender-specific roles assigned to various individuals when cooking and gathering as a family. The students participated in a special group activity, preparing cocoa rice. They were highly engaged throughout and thoroughly enjoyed tasting their creation.

# Year 7 - 10 CAT Results Available Now

At Cranbourne Secondary College, we use a range of assessments to track student progress and ensure every student gets the support they need. At the end of each term, the students in Years 7 – 10 sit CATs (Common Assessment Tasks) in all their subjects, which help teachers evaluate each student's learning over the term.

The results are formally reported to parents/guardians in the end-of-semester reports. However, the results for all the CATs are made available online through Literatu once moderation has occurred (early in the term following the CAT). You can ask your young person to share their Literatu profile with you, and the results for the Term 1 CATs are available now. As a reminder to your young person, the Literatu access codes are:

Log in: your school email @schools.vic.edu.au Password: password

Each student is initially set up with a password as 'password,' but we encourage students to change their password to protect their data. If they have forgotten their password, they can ask any of their teachers to reset it for them.



The above results belong to a Year 10 student. A more detailed look at the CAT cards is as follows:




This is the student's result for Year 10 English in CAT 1 2025. The student is working at Level 10, and they achieved a B grade. The L10 B can be interpreted as Level 10, B grade.




This result is for CAT 1 2025 from a student studying Year 10 Humanities: Law and Order. The student is working at Band 6 and achieved a C+ grade. The B6\_C+ can be interpreted as Band 6, C+ grade.

The Levels and Bands refer to the Victorian Curriculum achievement standards, which are provided in 11 Levels for English and Mathematics, or five or six bands for all other learning areas. It is appropriate for a Year 10 student to be working at Level 10 in Maths and Band 6 in Humanities.






School students can also purchase a half or full year student pass in their chosen area and must also carry a PTV Approved School Student ID card or PTV School Student ID card.
