From the Principal

Dear students, parents, carers and families,

I hope you are all well and are enjoying Term 3. As you will read in this edition of the newsletter, there have been an abundance of opportunities and experiences on offer for our students both inside and outside the classroom. Reading our newsletter is a great reminder for me of the privilege it is to lead our school community and work with our staff, students and families.

I hope you enjoy reading about our term so far.

The Victorian Teaching and Learning Model (VTLM 2.0) and Professional Learning.

As mentioned in previous newsletters, the Department of Education has continued to share more elements of the new Victorian Teaching and Learning Model (VTLM 2.0). As further detail becomes available I would encourage any interested parents to engage in the information shared here on the Department of Education website.

The VTLM 2.0 is based on the Science of Learning, whereby learning is defined as a change to long-term memory. The teaching practices that are considered of highest impact in relation to the model are commonly used in schools and classrooms. The research base that informs the science of learning provides further insight into which of these teaching

practices have the greatest impact in different contexts and stages of learning. This also extends to adapting existing practices and adopting new practices. It is highly valuable for schools to be able to focus on professional learning as new research and evidence become available and expectations of our profession evolve.

I am enjoying working with our staff as we learn together to continually strengthen our practice to improve learning and wellbeing outcomes for students.

Thank you for your ongoing support of our professional learning.

Building works

Our upgrade works are finally happening! The classroom and Library block closest to Stawell Street, commonly known as LC and C block, has been internally demolished and will be replaced by modernised classrooms, specialist STEM and Media

spaces, as well as a new Library and IT support space. The classroom spaces will also be able to serve as two clear yearlevel hubs.

for your patience, particularly as we transitioned our Library and IT spaces as well as making many room changes to accommodate classes.

Modifications have also occurred to our pedestrian entrances, with students predominantly using the gate near the administration building and car park.

Ongoing updates and progress images of our exciting upgrade will be shared via social media over the coming months.

The projected completion date is early Term 3, 2026.

The opening of this building will be a great way for the community to celebrate 50 years of education at Cranbourne Secondary College.

Administration car park

Due to the current building works, there is increased student food traffic around the administration area at the beginning and end of each day. This has highlighted potential dangers when families use the administration car park as a pickup and drop-off zone.

In reviewing the potential hazards and risks, I would request that parents and families refrain from using the administration car park for this purpose; instead, it is requested that families plan to use the surrounding streets when picking up or dropping off students.

Additionally, this will enable the disabled car parks to remain open for any members of our community requiring this access.

Year 9 News

City Experience

Year 9 CONNECT has been designed to give students experiential learning opportunities for personal and academic growth. Throughout Term 3, all Year 9 students have the chance to participate in the City Experience. Students, along with their CONNECT teachers, will travel into the city via public transport and participate in and experience a range of activities in the CBD. We will discover several of the key landmarks of Melbourne, developing our understanding of our culture and community. Students will view the city from the top of the Eureka Skydeck, explore the MCG and Botanic Gardens, and discover the beauty of the NGV. Classes not scheduled to travel into the city will remain at school and complete focused learning and activities.

With buses replacing trains from Cranbourne for two of the trips into the city, our students learnt more about scheduling, planning, and, most importantly, the ability to pivot and adapt. Our Year 9 students have been excellent as they navigated the streets and crowds to complete the scavenger hunt, which took them to the Arts Centre, St. Paul's Cathedral, Federation Square, Hosier Lane, Treasury Gardens, and Chinatown, as well as through the theatre district and CBD. Students developed their skills in navigation, communication and time management. Students learnt about key landmarks, historical figures and interesting facts about the city.

Iln the coming weeks, our students will form groups with their peers and plan for their final trip into the city as part of our City Experience. Students will travel in groups (restricted to the CBD) and explore the city, focusing on their interests. Students will share their detailed itinerary with their CONNECT teachers and will be contactable throughout the day. Staff will be located throughout the CBD to support students as they move in and around the city.


Looking Ahead








Book Week




Blue EDGE

Student Leaders Visit Building Works

The students reflected on the memories of the previous buildings while also gaining a glimpse into the future, with visuals and plans of what the new learning spaces will look like once complete.

The visit was filled with energy and excitement, as students, the Principal class, and SJ Higgins Group builders all came together to mark this important step in the school's journey. Many photos were taken to capture the moment, showcasing the strong sense of community and pride in this milestone project. This feel-good event signals the start of the next phase of learning at our school—a space designed to inspire collaboration, creativity, and growth for years to come.











Staff Professional Development

During Curriculum Day, staff came together for a dynamic one-hour Professional Learning Community (PLC) session led by the PLC team — Jane Carter, Erica Sherwood, Corey O'Shea, Sarah Carr, and Pam McGillivray.

Professional Learning Communities are small teams of teachers who meet regularly to look at student learning data, share strategies, and plan together. Their purpose is to ensure that teaching is consistent and effective, so every student receives the best possible learning experience. Families can think of PLCs as teachers working in partnership, constantly learning from each other to improve student outcomes.

The session explored our Semester 2 focus on maximising learning by obtaining and maintaining attention, particularly at the very start of our lessons. Staff were introduced to the core importance of attention by utilising explicit instruction and positive classroom management strategies. Strategies included: Opportunities to Respond (OTR), Check for Understanding (CFU), Do Now activities, Chunking, and Consistent Classroom Routines.

To deepen understanding, teachers actively engaged in three hands-on activities:

- See/Think/Wonder Data Reflection: staff analysed student data to identify trends, interpret possible causes, and pose key questions for inquiry.
- Strategy Sorting Challenge: Teams sorted classroom strategies, reflecting on what they already use in practice.
- Match a Crumb to the Data: Staff paired specific strategies with student feedback data, identifying clear, actionable links between teaching practice and student outcomes.

The energy in the room was fantastic, with rich conversations emerging around shared experiences and creative problem-solving. Teachers left feeling energised and ready to begin their Semester 2 PLC inquiry cycle, equipped with fresh strategies and a stronger sense of collaboration.

As one participant summed up: "It was practical, hands-on, and gave us the chance to think deeply about what works for our students. I'm excited to see how our PLC journey unfolds this semester."
